Durham Awarded First Place Winner For Annual Report

The Town of Durham has been selected as the "supreme" first place winner of the 2023 Annual Report Competition in the 2,500 to 4,999 population category.



The criteria used by Maine Municipal Association's fourperson review panel focused on the attractiveness of the cover and layout, as well as reader appeal; the presentation of the materials, including financial statements, statistics, and trends; and the use of tables of contents, photos, and graphics to succinctly inform readers of your community's achievements.

Update to the Senior Property Tax Stabilization Program

LD 290 "Property Tax Stabilization for Senior Citizens" **Repealed by State Legislature**

The LD 290 "Property Tax Stabilization for Senior Citizens" program, enacted in August 2022, was repealed by the Maine Legislature on

July 6, 2023, with an effective date of October 11, 2023. The popularly regarded program had allowed Maine seniors 65 and older who owned a permanent residence for at least 10 years and were receiving (or eligible for) a homestead exemption, to freeze taxes at the previous year's level regardless of income.



To help low-income seniors avoid higher property taxes and remain in their homes, two existing State programs are being expanded:

- The Property Tax Fairness Credit, which currently allows eligible Mainers to take a \$1,500 credit, has increased to \$2,000; it also loosens limits on the program in a way that allows the benefits to remain constant for a Mainer whose spouse passes away. - The State Property Tax Deferral Program, a lifeline loan program that covers the annual property tax bills of Maine seniors age 65 and older who cannot afford to pay them on their own, has been expanded. It doubles the income limit on that program to \$80,000 and also raises asset limits. Taxes must be paid back when the home is sold or becomes part of an estate. Fun Facts of Durham, Maine

Did you know ...

Durham had it's own post offices, one was located on West Methodist Corner, Route 9, inside the Merrill Store.

Merrill Store Post Office Mail Slot

"Did you know that Durham had several different post offices located in town? Each of Durham's four settlements (Southwest Bend, West Durham [Methodist Corner], South Durham and East Durham) had a

post office located within. Southwest Bend had the ES Warren Store, South Durham had Hussey's Store, West Durham was Merrill's Store and the location and name of East Durham's store is unknown at this time. In addition, Shiloh had its own post office. Each of the post office locations also served as a General's Store. By 1920, all the post offices were replaced with Rural Free delivery. In 1991, Durham was granted its own zip code, with service through the Lisbon post office. Before that, the town was served by rural routes from four surrounding



towns. The picture shown is of Merrill's Store, which was located on West Methodist Corner, Route 9. The building, but not the barn, was still standing into the 1950's. William Merrill (shown in the picture), owned

the store on Methodist Corner. William had a twin brother named Joseph. The Historical Society is now home to post office mail slots that were once housed within the Merrill Store."

Durham Fire's New Utility Truck #27

This 2022 Ford F-350 is Durham Fire's Utility 27. It came equipped with a Reading service body. The department uses it as a rapid response vehicle to respond to all town emergency scenes. It is also used to shuttle members between simultaneous calls, carry needed equipment to remote occupancies, transport damaged or used equipment and hoses, and set up barricades during storm responses. It carries medical, forceable entry and rescue equipment.
